Summary

The Conservation and Regeneration Award 2023 was won by Spenbeck, a female-only, family micro-SME in a male-dominated environment.

Former home of world-renowned Victorian international lace manufacturers Birkin & Co, the 40,000ft2 Grade II listed Birkin Building sits at the heart of Nottingham's historic Lace Market.

The Birkin Building Regeneration Project delivered the façade restoration of one of Nottingham's most architecturally and historically significant buildings to optimise energy performance and preserve it for future generations.

The four year project, lead solely by the two co-owner sisters, brought together Spenbeck, Historic England, McNeil Construction and Urban Fabric, specialist heritage stakeholders required to navigate the uncertainties and challenges both of Brexit and the pandemic to deliver an exemplar of heritage-led regeneration.

It has become the springboard for vocal advocacy for the urgent development of heritage skills and infrastructure.

The project preserved and built on the legacy of Spenbeck and its founder Mich Stevenson ose put, both of whom are synonymous with regenerating Nottingham's Lace Market in the 1990s.

Why this project won

- Fully committed to the highest standards of building materials and project delivery
- Project remit was over and above what was needed, for example:
- lead flashing on stone parapets which wasn't part of the original design to maximise the weathering protection
- the creation of an interactive online archive to publicly share the building's history
- Expertise and passion for heritage preservation shared by all the stakeholders using a collaborative approach
- Commitment to ensuring the industrial and cultural heritage was as valued and preserved as the architectural
- Multi-award winning project with equal focus on building preservation, environmental and maximising social value



Constructing the Gold Standard

- In 2021, Professor David Mosey CBE was asked by Cabinet Office to carry out an Independent Review of Public Sector Construction Frameworks.
- He consulted 120 organisations and 'Constructing the Gold Standard' is the result of his work.
- 'Constructing the Gold Standard' outlines an integrated and collaborative approach to framework procurement, contracting and management.
- Sets out 24 recommendations to help clients identify what questions they should ask when creating and implementing construction frameworks.
- Endorsed in the September 2022 update of the 'Construction Playbook'.



Verification Scheme

- Aims to ensure that Government and the wider public sector adopt urgent recommendations for improved value, reduced risks and achievement of net zero on all their construction projects.
- An objective system for recognising and supporting those framework providers and clients who adopt Gold Standard frameworks, framework contracts and action plans.
- Applicants to the scheme are verified based on their commitment to demonstrate how they are complying with the 24 Gold Standard recommendations.

Over 2,000 public sector construction frameworks are currently active.

There is a 20-25% chance of a supplier winning a framework project if the average success rate in framework loids is combined with the average success rate in call-off bids. Review participant report that, in addition to client procurement costs, the average bid cost for each major framework is owner EMATON for contractors are

over £130,000 for consultants, with a maximum of up to £1 million in each case, if one in four bids are successful, then up to £4 million must be recovered before a supplier delivers any value at all. Ultimately, all bid costs are recovered from clients, and these costs can only be justified if they enhance the quality of frameworks and contribute to significant value improvements.


Up to £1 million is spent by industry on a major framework bid.



Progress to date

- Constructing Excellence has established a Task Group to push progress and best practice in the implementation of the Gold Standard. The Task Group oversees the Scheme.
- Independent Verifiers are verifying seven pilot organisations
- Scheme formally launched at House of Lords November 2023
- Partial Verification: Ministry of Justice, Environment Agency, Scape, CHIC, LHC, Places for People and Crown Commercial Service.
- Constructing the Gold Standard Verification
 Scheme Constructing Excellence
